

Getting Started: IA Department Strategic Planning 2024-2029

The core of a successful organization lies on the organizational mission which can guide it into a specific pathway of goals and how to meet those goals with the intention of providing information on what the organization offers, and how it can serve its clients, customers, community, employees, and other stakeholders. This was the noble idea behind the Instructional Affairs (IA) Department endeavor when it convened in a series of training sessions with the Deans, Directors and ICs of the COM-FSM campuses during Summer 2023.

As part of the IA SWOT Analysis exercise, IA sub-units were tasked to review their essential functions, duties and responsibilities, through discussions and brainstorming. This resulted in the team's effort to align and draft missions and goals that reflects consistency across all 6 campuses.

The streamlining of the IA sub-units mission, goals and outcomes are guided by ACCJC Standards, the COM-FSM Board Policies and Procedures, and the Strategic themes and focus areas for Strategic Plan 2024-2029. The strategies taken in the formulation of the mission and goals ensured that they are all S.M.A.R.T.E.R. (Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic, Time-bound, Evaluated, Reviewed/Readjust).

Furthermore, this will ensure clear and specific missions and goals: can track progress, can be realistic and achievable, can be relevant and aligned to college mission, will have clear target dates, can be evaluated or assessed regularly, and can be reviewed and readjusted through improvement plans and appropriate implementation.

The outcomes of this SWOT Analysis exercise for each IA sub-unit from this Summer 2023 are depicted on the illustrations, as can be seen on the left. It should be noted that these are the recommended contributions to the newly installed administration's strategic planning foci on learner centered, continuous improvement, and best practices adaptation.



Sustaining the Quality of Instructional **Programs**

Efficient Assessment Mechanism in Place

The Department for Instructional Affairs in collaboration with the Office of the Academic Programs has currently established a mechanism that is perceived to be an effective and efficient approach to the periodic assessment of academic programs and courses. From each of the programs being offered at the college, a program coordinator was identified from the respective program faculty, tasked to lead in assessing program and course learning outcomes. Each program coordinator, in collaboration with the program faculty, will determine assessment strategies and collecting and reporting of assessment results in a timely manner, which will also require artifacts that will support the assessment done. This will make the program review more meaningful, and planning would be more productive with the goal of assuring the identification of gaps, preparing improvement plans, and ensuring "closing the loop", so that continuous improvement of all the academic programs will be accomplished.

In addition to the assessment task, the Program Coordinator will also assure the currency of all academic programs, ensure that all course outlines are periodically updated, and bench marking of program offerings with regional institutions will be done to assure that best practices are adopted and applied.

With this new mechanism in place, the assessment processes at the College could be more proactive and systematic with the aid of the college's Assessment Management System (AMS) known as TracDat.

New and Updated Course Outlines

A total of thirty-two (32) new and modified Course Outlines (COs) from different programs were endorsed by the Curriculum Committee (CC) and approved by VPIA department.

The Course Student learning Outcomes (CSLOs) of the said COs were written S.M.A.R. T. to ensure currency aligned with industry requirements, community needs and using latest editions of textbooks, etc. in order to capture new trends and innovations in respective programs' fields.

Academic Programs' Innovation

Introducing... The Business Administration Programs Seal



The Business Administration Programs include Associate of Science in Business; and Bachelor of Science in Business Administration with an emphasis in Accounting. Nodding to the college seal, where the college serves as the canoe that can bring students to their intended dream destinations, the Business Administration Programs make use of the five functional

areas of business (symbolized by the five quadrilaterals that will catapult students to become well-rounded individuals (circle). The four stars symbolize the growth of the students during their formation years in these programs, as they are continuously supported to achieve certain levels of proficiency in the various institutional student learning outcomes of the college. The darker blue circles represent the four Program Goals, and the four lighter blue circles signify the four Program Student Learning Outcomes of the programs. The round shape of the seal is not an attempt to conform to the usual way many seals are presented; this characterizes the intention of the college to mold students to possess its core values towards a life-long commitment to continuous improvement as an individual, a professional, and a member of the community, so that they can play important roles in the development of their home island states and ultimately, of the Federated States of Micronesia.

BSBAA Internship Program Launched

The Bachelor of Science in Business Administration with an emphasis in Accounting (BSBAA) program on its second year of operation, has embarked on the Internship Program aimed at providing a business student with an opportunity to gain knowledge and skills from a planned work experience in a business-related field. It is expected that at the end of the required 192 hours, students who have no working experiences yet will gain workplace competencies that will prepare them for an eventual work soon after their graduation. Those who are already working will be assigned to set goals that they will have to apply in their own work locations which will intend to level up their work performances and attain proficiency in their respective employments. With returning students from the former Third Year

Certificate in General Business and Third Year Certificate in Accounting programs, a total of 35 students interns this semester, and are expected to be the first batch of graduates this Fall 2023. Most of the students are working at the national, state, and municipal government agencies with only a few coming from the private sector.

Recognition and Inspiration of Evolving Excellence: Fisheries & Maritime Institute

LEARNER-CENTERED

- A total of 15 new cadets from Kosrae, Chuuk and Yap, started their training at FSM-FMI on Monday August 14, 2023. This new group and 14 second year cadets brings total number of cadets to 29. One new former female engineering graduate also enrolled in the master class 5 program in order to attain a dual class 5 master/engineer qualification.
- Though NORMA training overlaps with FMI BSS and Class 5 programs including shipboard training, the 3 trainings went smoothly.

CONTINUOUS IMPROVEMENT

- Eleven (11) NORMA trainees and three (3) trainers arrived in Yap FMI on the early Wednesday 7/5/23 morning flight, for their seven (7) weeks of BSS and PIRFO training. Two other SPC trainers later arrived on 7/12/23 to assist with the PIRFO courses. This training was funded by NORMA and FFA, and was completed on 8/18/23. All trainers and trainees departed FMI/YAP to their respective states on 8/23/23 on a United Airlines flight.
- Ms. Yumi Schultz, a long term JICA expert, will be working as a JICA coordinator for cadets affairs.
- An expert from the Wartisila Voyage Pacific Pte Ltd company in Singapore, Mr. Johnny Ong, provided training for all navigation instructors on the use and operation of the Bridge simulator. All navigation instructors received their certificates at the end of the training.

BEST PRACTICES

The Japanese Ambassador to FSM, Mr Hisashi Michigami, accompanied by his researcher, Ms. Maho Inomata, visited FMI on Tuesday August 15, 2023, at 15:00. A color guard presentation was performed by the FMI cadets in honor of ambassador Michigami.

A Spotlight on Challenges

Issues:

- Parainees attending workshops were in compliant with FMI regulations regarding alcohol possession, punctuality, and wifi use.
- Shipboard training cadet count was low, and delays were made.
- Cadet uniforms were not ready.

Recommendations:

- Seek public safety assistance, remind NORMA trainers to remind, reprimand and remove any trainee from the training who violated FMI rules and regulations. Impose strict rules and work closely with all concerned parties.
- Work closely with other COM-FSM state campuses student services staff on advertising FMI courses, and application. Visit high schools in other FSM states on a timely manner, and also work closely with their student services staff
- Send staff to procure uniforms in Guam without delay, and request more funds for cadets' supplies.

National Campus, filling a faculty position that was available. In April of 2023, he assumed the role of Acting Dean of Academic Programs, and on the 7th of September, he officially became the Dean of Academic Programs.

Yap Campus Instructional Coordinator

Jerry G. Fagolimul received his Bachelor's degree in Science & Mathematics from Hawaii Pacific University in 1983 and his M.Ed. in Curriculum Studies from University of Hawaii at Manoa in 2013. He previously worked for the college in the Upward Bound program for 10 years. He then left to take a seat in the Yap Legislature in 2011. Now



returned, he has been teaching under the Upward Bound Program and also teaching as a part-time instructor. On the 7th of September, he filled the Yap Campus' Instructional Coordinator position.

Honoring Legacies

Dr. Richard Allen Womack passionately served the college for over 3 decades. His love for education and for Micronesia inspired him to serve the college community up to his senior years. Dr. Womack was very instrumental to both the Education and Business divisions in the earliest years of development. He was well-liked by many and often sought out for advise. Dr. Womack on August 05, 2023. Although gone, he is remembered for his handwork, dedication, and determination among many others.





Professor Abraham started offering his services to the college on January 4, 2007. Abraham was an Education instructor who contributed much of his time and effort to ensure that FSM has enough teachers. His passion for teaching is reflected in his 16 years of service with the college. The college is saddened by the departure of Professor Abraham as his passing on August 07, 2023 was also a loss to the college. Abraham is remembered for his commitment to his work, as was reflected in his achievements. During the school year 2000-2001, he was the recipient of the Student's Choice award for which a faculty is nominated and selected by the student community.

Kosrae Campus Dean Mike Nena became a member of the family as the IC of Kosrae campus. After 11 years of being Instructional Coordinator , his dedication to the College earned him the promotion to become Dean of Kosrae campus. Nena departed from College because of medical reasons. Many remember him as an active and very involved member of the college management team.





John Haglelgam became an instructor in the Division of Social Science at the National Campus. In February 1992, the Board of Regents of the College appointed him as Regent Professor. Professor Haglelgam taught government and politics, Micronesian history, world history, and East Asian history, and was a strong advocate for preserving and reviving the knowledge of Micronesian history. His passion and devotion for such and for politics led to numerous meetings and negotiations that gained the college's governmental support to offer the History of Micronesia course as a General Elective for all Degree programs at COM-FSM. He served the college for 31 years and retired earlier this year.

Instructor Profile

Scholarly Achievement

A big congratulations to Prof. George Mangonon who just graduated in his PhD. in Business Administration at the Virgen Milagrosa University Foundation in the Philippines on July 4, 2023. Prof. Mangonon took advantage of the 2 year pandemic hiatus to finish his dissertation entitled, "The Micronesian Emigration Phenomenon: Its Knock-on Effects". His accomplishment is an additional credential to the new Business Administration degree program that the college started last Fall 2022. Prof. Mangonon has been



with the college since 2006 and his background in his previous work at the Department of Trade and Industry in the Philippines in initiating entrepreneurial livelihood projects for farmers surely can boost the business program, in addition to his educational attainment. He was a computer programmer and also worked as an Executive Assistant to a provincial government leader in his home province and these experiences can contribute to the enhancement in the different requirements of the program. Incidentally, Prof. Mangonon has already been awarded "Faculty of the Year" twice within his stint at the college.

New Faces

The institution has been fortified with the recruitment of a new faculty member, Dr. Nuno Pedrosa, an artist and researcher, who will be teaching *Introduction to Art* courses. He received his PhD in arts and sciences of the art from Panthéon-Sorbonne University and his MFA from the San Francisco Art Institute.





In addition to this, Dr. McClain Worswick has also been added to the college as a part-time instructor in the Business Administration Program. He holds a BS in Commerce-Business Administration, an MSc in Business Administration in Accounting & Finance, and a PhD in Commerce and Educational Administration.

Adding to The Excellence

In Kosrae Campus, Sharon Oviedo, a math instructor, got certified to teach Science course (with and without lab), eliminating the need for students to travel to the National Campus to take the required Science with lab courses.




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Additionally, two part-time instructors have been hired. Professor Alokoa Sigrah was hired to teach *Exercise Sports Science* courses, and Dr. Nick Zoa was hired to teach Science courses.

Counting Pillars

As of Fall 2023, the distribution of instructors across campus sites is as follows: National Campus currently employs 37 instructors, while CTEC Campus has a faculty count of 26, Chuuk Campus boasts a dedicated staff of 13, Kosrae Campus holds a team of 12, and Yap Campus supports 10 of our educators.

Strengthening Faculty



National Campus and CTEC Campus faculty members attended a Faculty Workshop that jump-started the Fall 2023 semester. Three issues were addressed:

- **Absenteeism Issue**: The number of students not showing up in class is growing. Remedial actions to this issue include: offering more courses in the Distance Learning mode of delivery, implementing and enforcing an attendance policy, and introducing this policy to new-comers or reminding continuing students of this policy during orientation.
- Contact Hours Issue: Concerns were raised about instructors ofter. Remedial actions include: providing make-ups for absences, uploading video recordings of lectures in Canvas, and furnishing evaluation forms regarding instructors' tardiness and absences.
- **Academic Advising Issue:** Some problems related to this issue include students enrolling into unnecessary courses or not being able to enroll into required courses due to pre-requisite difficulties. Remedial actions included: early course planning via contact with academic advisors, regular advising inventory to ensure correct course selections, and a system-based mechanism for course approval.

Additionally, the faculty members underwent curriculum mapping with the assigned program coordinators to devise an effective curriculum plan for the 2023-2024 assessment cycle.



At **CTEC Campus**, shortage of staff created opportunities to nurture versatility through cross-training, broadening skill sets of our faculty beyond their normal line of responsibilities. This has helped to address immediate issues, while also equipping our staff with the ability to adapt.



At Chuuk Campus, Faculty Workshop Fall 2023, the instructors established three committees:

- Absenteeism Committee whose role is to collect attendance for the first two weeks of instructions from the Face-to-Face classes for assessment and provide strategic plans to help combat the issue.
- Faculty/Student Interaction Committee whose role is to create a Facebook Group and invite students to discuss issues with faculty. Issues are not limited to class-related matters.
- Canvas Committee whose role is to conduct workshops during the first week of instruction (or more if needed) on the use of Canvas so that navigation would be more familiar to students.



At **Yap Campus**, a Faculty Workshop was held on the 4th of August tackling the following topics:

- Critical Thinking Skills Team Building Activities to Foster Teamwork Hands-On Use of Provided Technology

- Canvas: Dashboard Designing and Organizing
 Effective Strategies for Using Humor in the Classroom



At **FMI Campus**, 11 NORMA trainees completed 7 weeks of Pacific Island Regional Fisheries Observer (PIRFO) training and Basic Sea Safety (BSS) training. The training was funded by NORMA and FFA and assisted by 3 NORMA and 2 SPC trainers.

Faculty Show & Tell Project

COM-FSM President, Dr. Theresa Koroivulaono has created a platform for the faculty as a way to learn and keep abreast of the work being carried out by faculty members in the continuing cycle of improving and increasing the quality of COM-FSM Education.

Dr. Koroivulaono has earmarked from August 2023 to July 2024 the time frame to which the faculty can embark on the "Show and tell" project to the President.

The August presentation was on "Canvas learning platform, with teaching and learning software" carried out by Professor Dana Lee Ling, Math/Science Instructor from the National Campus.

Issues Corner

Challenges:



As of September 8, 2023, 25 positions at the college still remain vacant. Vacant positions are have been re-advertised due to interested applicant or a pool lacking the minimum qualifications.



Faculty had expressed low student participation in their online courses. Students have expressed concern over not being familiar with Canvas.



Students are hesitant to ask for assistance even when they are in urgent need of it. (Chuuk Campus)



Lack of certified staff to administer the Teacher Competency Examination (Chuuk Campus)



Kosrae Community Outreach had limited participants due to poor dissemination methods and time conflicts with other occurring events.

Recommendations:



An alternative to respond to challenges in hiring and vacancies, the IA department has aggressively recruitment part-time instructors and certified existing qualified full-time faculty to teach courses in other



The VPIA has reached out to VPEMSS to begin a collaboration on offering training sessions for students college-wide. Recommendations are in place to work with EMSS staff, beginning with working alongside counselors in scheduling of these Canvas sessions.



ICs should ensure that academic advisors are providing the necessary guidance to help inform students on where they can find help and who to seek support from.



Now that the Dean of Academic Programs position has been filled, one of his many objectives will include working closely with the Education Program coordinator to identify training opportunities and times to certify staff to administer the TCE.



Kosrae campus will continue to improve in recruitment efforts by working more closely with the larger community to avoid clashing schedules that can hinder community support and participation.

Chuuk Campus Debuts Vocational Boot Camp

On August 04, 2023 COM-FSM, Chuuk campus celebrated the completion of its first ever 5-week boot camp on basic trade skill training in the areas of Carpentry, Masonry, and Electricity. In its effort to respond to the need for CTE training as called for by the Chuukese community and its leadership. This response was an initiative brought on by the collaborative work of the Cooperative Research Extension (CRE) and the Instructional Affairs (IA) departments at COM-FSM that made the implementation of the program possible.

The 5-week boot camp entailed learning objectives that covered safety and ethics in the areas of carpentry, masonry, and electrical. Throughout the training, trainees engaged in activities that helped them meet certain learning objectives:

For carpentry and masonry objectives, trainees were expected to:

- Demonstrate the safe way of using hand tools commonly used in the construction trade.
- Read basic blueprint- what's in a set of blueprint.
- Find the number of lumbers needed for wooden walls and wooden floors/ceiling joists.
- Find the number of wall studs and wall sidings/ sub-flooring and ceiling.
- Compare wooden/timber structures to concrete/masonry structures.
- Build a wooden bench safely.
- Practice safety when using a hand tools and power tools.
- Find the number of CHB needed for a wall with and without openings.
- Measure, mark, and secure story poles properly.

For the electrical objectives, trainees were expected to:

- Demonstrate safety when using hand tools common in the electrical trade.
- Find the number of outlets, lights, octagons boxes, switches, Utility boxes, etc.
- Wire a single pole circuit.
- Wire a three-way circuit.
- Wire a split receptacle way circuit.

The successful outcomes of meeting these objectives resulted in the maintenance work that was done on Chuuk campus as well as out in the Chuukese community. This gave the opportunity for both the trainers and trainees to engage in the installation of air-conditioning at a private home of a Chuukese community member, the electrical wiring of COM-FSM hydroponic building, and the construction of new benches for Chuuk campus, along with other maintenance work that was done around Chuuk campus. Furthermore, the successful achievement of this boot camp resulted in 30 trainees having completed basic training in trade skills. The COM-FSM community is grateful to the Chuukese leadership and the community for this call and to Chuuk and CTEC campuses for making this call a reality.





A huge thank you to CTEC instructors Xavier Yarofmal and Romino Victor for their dedication to this training. The leadership and support of Chuuk and CTEC campus deans, along with CRE coordinator are also very much appreciated. The success of this first-ever boot camp proves that this will be the beginning of many more learning opportunities like this one. They have truly demonstrated the core of the college mission: Promoting learner-centered activities, implementing best practices, and striving for continuous improvement.

Collaborating with Internal and External Stakeholders

👛 Waseda University

The college collaborated with Waseda University over research on "Students" perception of Micronesian Economy". One hundred students were involved in a series of experiments from September 4 - 6. This provided a good venue



for our students to experience a different platform of learning through the experiments conducted by the researchers.

The relationship between the college and Waseda University dates back to more than 2 decades ago, in 2002, when an agreement between the parties was made that enabled the facilitation of faculty visits, student admissions, and exchange students.

Visits by faculty and students of Waseda University have been made since, and COM-FSM students have been offered multiple scholarship opportunities to study at Waseda University. The scholarship opportunities include one-semester studies, one-year studies, and the occasional summer programs.



Ritsumeikan University

Eight students from Ritsumeikan University visited COM-FSM National Campus to engage in learning exchanges with COM-FSM students from September 3 through 10.





USFS & MCT

COM-FSM currently shares an MOU with the United States Forest Service/Micronesia Conservation Trust sponsored internship with the College of Micronesia and Pohnpei Resources and Development.

COM-FSM was identified as the intern's host organization, and will provide space for the intern to work, laboratory space and equipment to process the manual turbidity sample and to safely store equipment, and space to use the provided field laptop to save and share data. The host organization will provide a faculty mentor who will advise and help the intern when necessary and answer questions about the monitoring and research process, water quality,



mangroves etc., and with requesting supplies or services to be purchased using the USFS funding.

Professor Peltin Olter-Pelep was selected by the Vice President for Instructional Affairs to be the advisor to the student intern. The student intern, Jeanylynn Aimy Andrew is a Marine Science Student at COM-FSM. Under this project, COM-FSM will receive funding through a contract with MCT that will specify overhead and administration costs, hiring and payment to the intern, procurement and supplies including transportation and fuel costs, etc. To date, Professor Olter-Pelep has led 4 field trips to monitor the collection of turbidity samples.





Kosrae Campus' Community Outreach

Kosrae Campus carried out a community outreach across the 4 municipalities (Tafunsak, Lelu, Malem, and Utwa) from July 24th through 28th. Meetings were conducted from 4 pm to 6 pm, and were mainly focused on raising awareness of the program offerings at the College and to encourage enrollment, namely, for those who previously discontinued shortly after enrolling. Additionally, participants were given the

opportunity to input their thoughts on what programs they wished to see offered (in Kosrae Campus & at the College in general) in the future.

Over all the meetings, 66 people participated this community outreach: 12 from Tafunsak, 10 from Lelu, 14 from Malem, and 30 from Utwa



Faculty and staff who participated in the outreach thought that their efforts in promoting the college were worth it. They acknowledged issues regarding dissemination strategies and proper calendaring, and hope that these challenges are given solutions before the next community outreach.

Preparing for the Next Attempt

The issues underlying the outreach were that of poor dissemination strategies and time conflicts.

The meetings were announced to the public by means of a radio station in Lelu. Unfortunately, this means that only people in Lelu received the announcements. Ironically enough, Lelu had the least amount of participants compared to the other municipalities. Nonetheless, other means of communicating future community outreach efforts will include the use of social media, religious gatherings, and community meetings.

The meetings scheduled were in conflict with community meetings within the municipals. Additionally, over 400 Kosraens departed to Pohnpei for the Presidential Inauguration that took place on the 28th. Time conflicts with these events limited the audience count for the meetings. Occurring activities within the community should be taken into consideration before the next community outreach is launched.

Added Features in AMS (TracDat)

The said Assessment Management System (AMS) of the college provides data and information for administrative and program planning, assessments, and program

The Instructional Affairs Administrative Unit and sub-units have added a new feature where VP, Deans, Directors, and ICs can submit their monthly report on a deadline-driven scheme to foster high levels of organization and efficiency. Under the instructional units, Program Assessment Summaries (PAS) and Instructional Program Reviews (IPR) can be systematically added. Currently, Mr. Fiji Meshak Phillip is the usersupport specialist who assists the IA administrators and instructors across all campuses. Mr. Phillip is a recent product of the Business Administration program and one of 3 Spring 2023 class Valedictorians. COM-FSM is honored to have him on board.
