College awards \$3.8 million Pell Grant to 1,481 students

230 students received \$208,020 from FSM National, State, and other scholarships

National Campus. The college's Financial Aid Office (FAO) reported that as of April 15, 2017, it awarded \$3,873,491.90 Pell Grant to 1,481 students this spring 2017 semester. According to Faustino Yarofaisug, FAO director, "Of the 1,719

students registered this spring 2017, 1,650 (or 96%) are Pell eligible." He further added that as of report, 90% (or 1,481 students) of the Pell eligible students, have been awarded Pell grant, as shown in table 1.0 below:

614 students participated in the Supplemental Education Grant (SEG) Work-Study Program

National Campus. The college's Financial Aid Office (FAO) reported that 614 students enrolled at the college and the FSM Fisheries and Maritime Institute (FSM FMI) participated in the SEG Work-Study Program. According to the FAO Work-Study Coordinator, "of these 614 students, 331 are from the National Campus, 157 from the CTEC-Pohnpei, 22 from Chuuk Campus, 36 from Yap Campus, 13 from Kosrae Campus,

and 55 from the FSM FMI." These students received a total of \$137,168.25 from the SEG Work-Study Program, he added.

FAO Work-Study Coordinator also reported that seven US former servicemen enrolled this semester at the National Campus received \$7,975.00 from the work-study program for veterans under the US department of Veteran Affairs.

College organized college fairs and visits to high schools

National Campus. The college will be holding college fairs inviting students who have been admitted for summer 2017 and fall 2017 via the COMET. College fairs have been scheduled on April 17, 2017, for

Kosrae Campus, April 25, 2017, for Chuuk Campus, and April 28, 2017, for National Campus and CTEC-Pohnpei. High school visits have been scheduled for Yap State, April 19-20, 2017.

College to admit 992 seniors and other students in summer or fall 2017

76% of the 1,308 students who took the COMET last January 26 to February 10, 2017 are admitted, while 24%, non-admitted

National Campus. The college administered COM-FSM Entrance Test (COMET) to 1,308 seniors from private and public high schools in the Federated States of Micronesia (FSM) including other students at the state campuses last January 26 to February 10, 2017.

According to the college's registrar, "Of the 1,308 students, 433 are admitted as degree-level, 154 into Achieving College Excellence (ACE), and 405, certificate-level." He further added that the college has seen an increase in the percent of students who have been placed into degree as compared to last spring 2016 COMET, and a decrease in the percent of non-admits. Results of the COMET show that 33% of the students who took this year's COMET are placed as degree-level; while only 26% were placed as degree-level last spring 2016. Further, only 24% of the students who took the spring 2017 COMET are non-admit, as compared to 26% last year's COMET.



Seniors from Kosrae High School attended the April 17, 2017, college fair at COM-FSM Kosrae Campus.

The registrar also reported that the 1,308 students and other students do not include seniors from from high schools on Mortlocks, Moch, and Weipat in Chuuk State, and the Neighboring Island Central High School on Woleai, Yap State. While the test materials from these high schools were received by the college's VP for Enrollment Management and Student Services (VPEMSS) Office last quarter of March 2017, results are not available as of report, the regisrar further added.

Updates: Center for Entereprenuership

National Campus. The Center for Entrepreneurship (Center) had an active spring semester. The Center partnered with the Business Division to hold the Friday Food Fashion Festival (F4) at the Spanish Wall Baseball Field. The event was attended by hundreds of patrons who spent thousands of dollars with over twenty student businesses. Some F4 businesses, such as Tehka, a Kosraen hot sauce company, even received bulk orders from local restaurants.

The Center also invested in the Techno student club on Pohnpei Campus to build several massive Bluetooth Speaker setups, which sold almost before the event began. The success of the F4 has given all those involved motivation to make the event even bigger and better next year, by expanding it to include other local entrepreneurs as well.

Hydroponics of the Pacific (HOP), a business within the Center's incubator program, received a \$5,000 grant from Global Greengrants to build hydroponics prototypes throughout Pohnpei and the outer islands. There are already plans for three different prototypes at a local home, a local market, and an outer atoll.

The Center also hosted Roundtables with the International Office for Migration to brainstorm solutions to problems with emergency response and a Roundtable with Bill and Nigel Jaynes to discuss management of a radio station (the Center hopes to restart the College radio station for the fall semester).

The Center also worked with the Scuba Sharks student club to go on several dives and to start a sponge farm for fundraising efforts.

Other activities still in infancy include a public speaking workshop and a music

College to update articulation with UOG; renew GenEd agreement with UH-Hilo

CCP/Chaminde University requested meeting to renew articulation agreement









Vice President for Instructional Affairs (VPIA) is working with the University of Guam (UOG) to update the articulation agreement, which includes general education courses, the third year education courses, and the third year business courses. VPIA is also working with the University of Hawaii at Hilo (UH Hilo) to renew the general education articulation agreement and establish 2+2 or 2+3 pathways. The 2+2 pathways work for most degrees and the first will be for business management. The 2+3 pathways will be those degrees in the STEM areas with Marine Science being the first for consideration. COM-FSM will need to reconsider content in the foundation sciences for a shorter pathway in the future.

Caroline College and Pastoral Institute (CCPI)/Chaminade University has requested a meeting to renew the articulation of COM-FSM courses to Chaminade University. This will aid students especially at Chuuk Campus who wish to transfer to the programs offered by Chaminade University through the CCPI campus.

Food and Fashion Friday Festival (F4)



Food and Fashion Friday Festival (F4)sponsored by the Business Division and the Entrepreneurship Center in collaboration with Pohnpei Campus CTE program, Hospitality and Tourism Management, and the Agriculture Student Club held their end of semester event on April 7, at the Spanish Wall from 5:00 pm -8:00 pm. Food & Fashion Friday Festival is a collaborative project that the division faculty uses as a tool to assess selected A.S. Business Administration program and course student learning outcomes. Students involved, who are taking basic courses in Management, Marketing, and Finance, began their preparations as early as the second week of January 2017. They put together business plans, marketing

plans, and cash flow projections. They also drafted their partnership agreement and articles of incorporation. These included a male and female bathing /personal care training mannequins, male and female physical examination mannequins, Doppler machine, teaching models of the upper and lower extremities, teaching model of a heart, and pregnancy model. The Agriculture and Natural Resources Management program received to commercial grade meat cutters and one vacuum packing machine to complete the food processing lab.

The COM-FSM 2016 Audit is still in progress and it is expected to be completed before June 30, 2017.

- There are 28 classroom teachers from the Chuuk State DOE enrolled at your Chuuk Campus this semester in two courses: 18 are enrolled in ED 213-Multi-Grade Classroom Teaching, and 10 enrolled in ED 210-Intro to Professional Teaching. Their tuition, fees, and supplies are all to be paid for by the State DOE.
- ▶ Faculty had workshops that included presentation and discussion of 'Best Practices' under ACCJC Five Benchmarks on Student Success. This is an on-going training for faculty to enhance and improve certain aspects of instructional delivery, student and teacher collaboration and interactions, assessment and evaluation, and related areas of instructions. Out of the 5 benchmarks, "Active and Collaborative Learning' and 'Student Effort" are the two that have recently been reviewed and intensely discussed.
- Students, faculty and staffs celebrated COM-FSM Founding Day on March 30th, and Cultural Day on March 31th. Although the Cultural Day was a holiday, many staff and faculty members joined the students celebrate their cultures with activities including building local hut, preparing food using traditional methods, chants, speeches, songs and dances.

Yap Campus & FSM Fisheries and Maritime Institute (FSM FMI)

- Founding Day Celebration was held on March 30th with a parade around the lagoon in town followed by games at the FMI Campus. The procession was led by 7 FMI cadets with colors/flags of the FSM, Kosrae, Pohnpei, Chuuk, Yap, COM-FSM, and FMI followed by a float with students in varying traditional attire of the FSM States. Theme for the celebration was *Unity through Culture & Sports*. Drawing for the 50/50 Raffle was part of the celebration at FMI with winners broadcasted live by V6AI radio station. Prizes given were: \$2,500 Grand Prize, \$1,000 1st, \$700 2nd, \$500 3rd, \$200 4th, and \$100 5th. There were also 5 consolation prizes consisting of items with college logo and garden tools made by the FMI Welding class.
- College Fair activities were held April 5th at FMI and 6th at Yap Campus. FMI faculty members and cadets showcased their programs and demonstrated what they do best in Navigation (Bridge Simulator), Marine Engineering (outboard motors, engines, and welding), and Fishing Technology (rope tying & fishing gear making & mending). Several agencies, such as EPA, Micronesian Red Cross, Workforce Enrichment Program, Public Health Div., Marine Resources, Airport Rescue Fire Fighting (ARFF), and Yap Campus CRE and Student Services. Participants included some community members and community school students. The Fair at Yap Campus had 277 participants, including staff from many agencies, who partnered with our staff to share information about the various COM-FSM programs and their respective types of careers. Our staff partnered with Bank of FSM, Bank of Guam, Ayuw Community Services, and Office of Public Auditor to disseminate information about our business administration program. A total of 28 agencies participated as this was an excellent opportunity to share information with all our participants, especially our students and the students from YHS, YCHS, CMS, YSDA, St. Mary's, and several ECE centers. Tour guides included students from Dr. Wigfall's EN/CO 205 class as an assignment to apply what they have learned by demonstrating social ease, proxemics, kinesics, and linguistic sensitivity. They excelled, had fun engaging with the many participants while offering an important "public service." Raffle prizes (vegetables, flower plants, garden tools, etc.) were given to students and agencies staff as appreciation for their participation. Bags and selfie sticks were donated by FSM PC as prizes.
- Shipboard training for 26 second year cadets on MV Navigator took place in March. Thanks to FSM TC&I for their assistance and support in accommodating our cadets on board the ship. The training was an excellent opportunity for our cadets to experience first-hand work as a seaman.
- ▶ All program course outlines have been completed and approved with assistance from VPIA Simion and DAP Dison. Course outlines will be delivered to TC & I and posted on the college website under Academics.
- Daishin Fishing Company will be at FMI April 11th to recruit graduating cadets for their company in Japan. NORMA and another organization will also be coming to FMI in May to also recruit our graduating cadets.

Facilities and Maintenance

Capital projects

Design contract agreement is in routing process at the National Government Offices and is expected to complete by the week of April 10, 2017. Attached is the design task timetable for reference.

Building Maintenance

The building at Pohnpei Campus currently occupied by the TRIO program namely, TSP and UB has been reassessed and determined to be hazardous. This building is one of those proposed for demolition at Pohnpei Campus. The President has approved relocation of the programs occupying the building are being proposed to relocate to the former Bank of Hawaii and current Moylan's Insurance Office is located. Lease agreement for the building is being reviewed along with improvements needed.

Pohnpei Campus SBDC building drainage ditch and retaining wall work has been completed. This project allows the toilet facility recently completed to be opened and improve storm drainage to avoid flooding of the ground floor CRE offices.

Shuttle Service

Revenues from the Intercampus Shuttle System was able to finance a replacement shuttle bus that has arrived to replace unit number #4 that has been grounded for repair. When Unit #4 is repaired it will be reserved for and standby unit

such time that it is determined to surveyed. Currently the shuttle service transports more than 300 students per day and generates more than \$12,000.00 during regular semesters.

Sea Transportation


The Snapper boat transferred from FSM-FMI now awaits for Tachometer/Engine Temperature and oil pressure gauge to be mobilized. The acquisition of the 33 foot with twin 115 HP engines is intended to support and improve safety in sea transportation field trips. The Marine Science, Scuba and other research programs currently utilize a 22 foot with 40 HP engine that sometimes can become inadequate and unsafe for field trips.

Energy conservation and reduction program

Message has been received by suppliers from China that the shipment of LED light has left China on April 5, 2017. It is anticipated to arrive late May of early June. Following the arrival of the LED lights installation of the lights will commence at the National and Pohnpei Campus. The second purchase of LED lights will be shipped directly to Kosrae, Chuuk and Yap.

This investment in this project is forecast to reduce more than \$60,000.00 annually in utility cost system wide. The direct purchase of LED lights from China has lead to a saving of approximately \$35,310.00 compared to purchasing from local and regional suppliers.

Business Office: Endowment Fund Investment, as of March 31, 2017



The market value of endowment fund has increased by \$560k or 11% due to unrealized gain of \$360K or 8% and additional investment of \$200K since September 2016.






- ▶ The market value of the cash reserved fund increased by \$93K or 3% since September 2016.
