Spring 2013 Semester Enrollment

The College has registered 2,339 students with 26,602.5 registered credits (or 2,216.88 full-time equivalent students). Table below shows the distributions of the Spring 2013 semester enrollment by campus.

The above table shows an overall enrollment of FTE students less than head-counts. Except for the National Campus which has a higher FTE students enrollment than its head-counts, all State Campuses have less FTE students than head-counts.

Spring 2013 enrollment vs. FY 2013 revenue projection

The College's overall Spring 2013 enrollment is below the FY 2013 revenue projection in registered credits and FTE students by 6.81% (1,945.5 credits and 162.13 FTE students, respectively). While the National Campus surpassed its FY 2013 revenue projection by 10.19%, all State Campuses are below their projections by 9.80% to 26.36%.

Counseling Office and the A+ Center

The coordinator reported that as of report date, the following number of games were played: basketball (15), volleyball (24), badminton (8), and table tennis (8). Billiard and the soccer games are still in the scheduling process while softball, depending on the availability of the softball field. Furthermore, he also reported that:

- 360 students are currently participating in the Founding Day 2013 ball games. The number does not include the students participating in the soccer and softball games that are yet to be scheduled
- As a result of the continuous college-facilitated tournaments, leagues, and clinics, 7% of active participants had built self-confidence and motivation as evidenced in their participations to higher levels of sports competitions organized by the State of Pohnpei and other nongovernmental organizations.

Usages of the Sports and Recreation facilities

The coordinator reported that its office's log shows 725 counts of students utilizing sports and recreation facilities, and 351 counts of students using the weight lifting room facilities.

Other events and activities

- As part of its commitment to capacity building through continuous training for staff, one staff participated in a two-day water rescue and CPR training. The staff is awaiting receipt of his certification as proof of completing the aforesaid training.
- Organized December 8-20, 2012 basket tournament participated by several teams representing various private and public high schools in Pohnpei State.
