2014 Pacific Financial Aid Association (PacFAA) Annual Conference

Tetaake Yee Ting, work-study coordinator of the college's Financial Aid Office, participated in the 2014 PacFAA annual conference last March 31-April 1, 2014. The conference which was held in Honolulu, Hawaii, provided essential training through relevant sessions in order to enhance participants' professional development. Mr. Yee Ting will schedule echo workshops to FAO and other support services staff across the college.

US Veterans IHL Compliance Survey

The college's US VA school certifying official (SCO) had completed the 2014 fiscal year compliance survey of VA beneficiary records. The survey commenced last October 2013, and ended with an exit phone interview last May 9, 2014. The purpose of the compliance survey is to advise the school administration of the laws and regulations governing the payments of education benefits to VA beneficiaries, and to examine the records of specific beneficiaries to ensure the propriety of payment (ACCIC IIB, SD 1, IEMP SS1, SS2, SS3 and SS4).

Academic Transcripts, Certificates of or Verifications of Enrollment

During the months of March and April, 2014, the Office of Admissions, Records and Retention (OARR) had processed and released 156 academic transcripts and 16 certificates of enrollment in support of students and former students' applications for admissions to other higher education institutions, scholarship grants, employments, and others (ACCJC IIB, SD 1, IEMP SS1, SS2, SS3 and SS4).

Counseling Services: Workshop on successful essay writing

The college's counseling services facilitated a workshop on successful essay writing last April 28, 2014 to 17 participants. The primary purpose of the workshop is to prepare students for transferring to other higher education institutions in the U.S. To assess the effectiveness of the workshop, pre- and posttests were administered to all 17 participants. Results showed 41% and 94% of the participants scored => the median in the pre- and posttests, respectively. (ACCJC IIB, SD 1, IEMP SS1, SS2, SS3 and SS4).

Peer Counseling Center

The college's Peer Counseling Center (PCC) facilitated last March 14, 2014 an outreach on Sexually Transmitted Infections to 15 female RH-resident students. To assess the effectiveness of the outreach, pre-and posttests were administered to the participants. Results showed that 29% and 100% of the participants scored => the median in the pre-and posttests, respectively. Additionally, PCC also organized an Awakening Retreat last April 16-19, 2014 to 17 students. Held at Black Corals, the purpose of the retreat is to awaken the *true self* (hidden self) of the participants so that they are able to realize who they really are; as such, put them on the right track of life. (ACCJC IIB, SD 1, IEMP SS1, SS2, SS3 and SS4).

COM-FSM 2014 Health Fair

The college's health services in collaboration with government, non-government health service providers and non-profit organizations organized last April 23, 2014 the COM-FSM 2014 Health Fair with "Eat wise and exercise. Let's go" as the theme. The fair was attended by more or less 650 participants, and activities included: health screening, administration of flu/pneumonia vaccinations, deworming, distribution of IEC materials, several demonstrations such as healthy cooking, aerobic exercises, and others. To determine the level of perceived satisfaction about the 2014 COM-FSM Founding Day, a survey was administered to a nonprobability sample of 210 faculty, staff and students. Sports and Recreation Routine Services
