Extension agents collaborated with NRCS along with our JICA senior volunteer to promote the use of compost in Pohnlangas High School to 10 th graders and the special head program at their farm in Pohnlangas.

	A	The spawning trial for sandfish sea cucumber #16 had produced 7,000 larvae until pentactula were transferred on March 19 into the simulator habitat raceway tanks to monitor the grow rate. However, It took about 15 days rearing by feeding in the incubator tanks until they reach for settlement. On this occasion the larvae settle to become juvenile and will be transferred to the juvenile grow out areas (hapat) at the designated area for restocking purpose. After monitoring for one month, we will get the result of counting juveniles growing in the raceway tanks.
	4	Staff program on pearl project visited Peniou to harvest half-pearls and checking the retention rate for round pearl seeded in August 2011. Training and demonstration were conducted during the harvest and checking the retention rate.

	 Kosrae AES Initiated new cultures of banana, cassava, swamp taro and soft taro. Prepared media and sub-cultured 2,700 banana, swamp taro, cassava and soft taro. Produced 4,600 seedlings of soft taro and sweet potato and distributed 1,600 seedlings. Produced 900 seedlings of vegetables and distributed 196 seedlings. 	Family, community and school gardening interests among private sectors particularly Chuuk Women's Council increased after the local government declared Chuuk under health emergency due to non-community disease problems. CRE Chuuk continued extending technical assistance in promoting care and management of crops using plant and other organic materials found locally for soil enrichment and pest control.
	Climate Change/ Small Island Agriculture Systems
	Efforts of the Agriculture and the Community Resource and Development programs had positive results as follows:

Several Truk lagoon islands (Eót, Romanum and Údot) became aware of effects of salt sprays and salt water intrusion caused by climate change in their livelihood and properties including plants from community agriculture outreach activities. They recognized that they had adaptation strategies like establishing seawalls and maintaining mangrove trees.

The awareness of communities for effects of environmental pollution from improper solid waste in increasing climate change impacts to people's health, water and food quality was evident from community clean ups led by local village women's group in Weno.

Community Resource and Development (CRD)

CRD Agent focused on generating family incomes through implementation of the following projects: Culinary Arts, Sewing, Traditional handicrafts and Recyclable handicrafts with individual homemakers and in schools.

Youth Agent initiated recruitment of out-ofschool youth, drop outs and those students needing review assistance to pass COMET and entrance tests in high schools.

Health and Nutrition/EFNEP

CRE Coordinator and EFNEP Agent participated in fighting NCDs as members of Task forces against Anti-Smoking and Alcohol, Diabetes and Cancer. Other

	efforts joined the fight against cancer in islands of Tol, Údot, Tonowas and Polle through information about local produce rich in anti-oxidant properties.
